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Profanity

It truly is shocking how prevalent profanity is in our society today. Even in the movies they are given to excess. The movie, "The Wolf of Wall-Street," released in 2013, had an unbelievable tally of 569 F-words. One would tend to think if you removed them you would have cut the movie time in half.

We have grown to expect vulgar language in our society. It is tragic as some children learn profanity even before they learn their ABC's. But what is alarming is when one hears such language emerge from the lips of a professed Christian.

"Let no corrupt word proceed out of your mouth, but what is good for necessary edification, that it may impart grace to the hearers" (Eph. 4:29).
